

## **PRESENTATION:** Department of Information Services

**Dr. Bob Gulick**, WLS Director of Technology, shared with the Board the challenges the Department of Information Services faces daily with its servers, offices, storage, disposal, and training areas separated from one another.

The current system results in severe time inefficiencies (unloading, inventory, prep, delivery, service, and disposal). Equipment security is not optimal and DIS staff collaboration and communication is limited.

There is a need for a secure, unified workspace that is centrally-located and has a delivery door. Square footage needs include a training lab, office space, workbench space, meeting space, and storage space for parts, equipment, software, and disposal. A potential site was identified and shared.



The Department of Information Services is currently divided among four separate areas of the Whitmer campus (*above*). The Training Lab is housed at the Administration Building.

The Whitmer Cheerleading Competition Team placed 5th in the state in their second year in existence. The state competition was held March 3 at Ohio State University.



Norm was a 20-year teacher in the Washington Local Schools and had the fourth-most wins as a football coach in the history of the district. He had a motto of *"We can, we will, and we must!"* When we think that we're reinventing things here in 2013, we often find that what's new has been done before. Norm set a standard. His last two years in the Great Lakes League, he was 17-1-2. Sometimes we forget and only think of the most recent incredible things that happen here athletically and academically. It wasn't too long ago, in 1968, that Norm was leading us to 17 wins out of 20 games and was coach of the year, and we had a state ranking. He was one of the many folks who built the foundation we are blessed to stand on. Please keep Norm's wife in your thoughts and prayers.
