

VETERANS NIGHT



Excerpts from an ALUMNUS LETTER

I just finished up my first year of nursing school (whew!). Grades are looking superb, and I couldn't be any happier with my choice of going to EMU. I am looking to graduate on time, in a total of 4 years with my BSN.

I usually make stops in to Monac and Whitmer to see you all, but that may not be happening for a while. A grand opportunity has just been given to me and I will be accepting it. I have been offered a full-time volunteer position at the University of Michigan research lab where I will be working with Dr. Bartlett and his team of doctors, doing extensive research on a vast variety of things.
