SPECIAL PRESENTATION: Mobile Summer Meal Program

Fifty-six percent of Washington Local students are classified as economically disadvantaged, and many of our students receive free or reduced-price meals during the school year.

Last summer, staff from our Nutrition Services Department and our Transportation Department collaborated on a new initiative – a mobile Summer Meal Program. Free meals were served June 20th - August 12, Monday through Friday, at four sites in the district. Debra Warren, Supervisor of Nutrition Services, said the program reached nearly 100 students on some days.

The program was provided in cooperation with the Ohio Department of Education and Summer Meal Partners of NW Ohio.

AWARD of EXCELLENCE: BRAEDEN BROWN



The *Toledo Blade* recently ran a feature story about **Braeden Brown** – a Whitmer culinary arts senior whose curiosity, ambition, and effort landed him a job at the prestigious restaurant Element 112 owned by executive chef **Chris Nixon**.

Braeden developed a love of culinary arts in Whitmer's junior class program, working in the Campus Café restaurant. A few months ago, Braeden was grocery shopping and approached a man in chef's attire, not knowing the man owned a restaurant. The conversation led to Mr. Nixon saying he was looking for help and asking him to come over, but when Braeden asked for his number, he was told to "figure it out."

Landing the position required a three-hour "tryout" in the kitchen, mincing jalapenos and creating hors d'ouevres. Keeping the position took effort and hard work, at which Braeden excels, Mr. Nixon said.

Today, when he is not at school, Braeden works as a chef de partie – line cook – under Mr. Nixon and other world-class chefs. Braeden is also in the process of applying to the Culinary Institute of America in Hyde Park, New York.


