This is a reminder for **parents of senior students** that you need to get your child's meningitis booster vaccine date to the nurse if you haven't already done so. I sent a SwiftReach k12 email and phone call in August to the parents of students that don't have documentation of their meningococcal A, C, W, And Y (MCV4) vaccine.

## Senior students without proof of immunization will be excluded from school on Monday, September 12th.

If your child still needs their vaccine, please contact your provider to get this scheduled! Local pharmacies all offer the vaccine, but please check what your copay will be before the immunization is given as it can be quite costly depending on your insurance. In addition, The Toledo Lucas County Health Department Shots for Tots and Teens program offers free and reduced cost vaccines. No one is turned away for inability to pay. You must make an appointment if you plan to use their program. The S4T appointment line is (419) 213-2884. In addition, you must take a copy of your child's current immunization record with you to the appointment. Contact me if you need a copy of your child's shot record. 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Title I Information 2022-2023

Dear Parent/Guardian:

You have the right to know the teaching qualifications of your child's classroom teacher in a school receiving Title I funds. The federal Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) requires that any local school district receiving Title I funds must notify parents that they may ask about the professional qualifications of their child's classroom teacher.

These gualifications include:

- 1. Whether the teacher has met the Ohio teacher licensing criteria for the grade level and subject areas in which the teacher provides your child instruction. Whether the teacher is teaching under emergency or temporary status that waives state licensing
- 2. requirements.
- The undergraduate degree major of the teacher and any other graduate degree or certification (such as National Board Certification) held by the teacher and the field of discipline of certification or 3.
- degree. Whether your child is provided services by an instructional paraprofessional and, if so, their 4. qualifications.

In addition, you may request district policies regarding student participation in state mandated assessments such as the Ohio State Tests. The information on student participation in state tests can be found here: https://www.wis4kids.org/TestingInformation.aspx, You can also receive the test information by sending your request to the address below.

You may ask for the information by sending a request to the Washington Local Schools, Attn: Curriculum Department, 3505 W. Lincolnshire Blvd., Toledo, OH 43606. Be sure to include the following information with your request: student's full name, parent/guardian's full name, address, city, zip code, teacher's name, grade and school.

### WHY DID WE MOVE TO A FALL YEARBOOK DELIVERY THREE YEARS AGO?

1. Going to a fall delivery provides more instructional time on course related concepts that will result in a better finished product.

2. Having a fall delivery allows staff to cover the full year of events and is truly a comprehensive look at Whitmer High School. It affords the opportunity to have prom, senior block party, and graduation covered in the yearbook, as well as spring sports and activities. There is no need for a supplement that may get lost one day.

3. At this time, approximately 85% of yearbooks in Ohio are fall deliveries. A majority of communities see the value in covering the entire school year.

4. Families have the additional time to pay for a yearbook for their student. Yearbooks are expensive and the later delivery time gives families time to save, or enter into a payment plan for their student.

5. Along the same lines, families who wish to purchase a senior spotlight ad will have additional time to save the money, or complete a payment plan.

#### Keep Your Child On Track in Middle and High School: Pay Attention to Attendance

Even as children grow older and more independent, families play a key role in making sure students access learning opportunities and understand why attendance is so important for success in school and on the job. Families can also advocate for resources to help students learn if they cannot attend in-person.

#### DID YOU KNOW?

- Students should miss no more than 9 days of school each year to stay engaged, successful and on track to graduation.
   Frequent absences can be a sign that a student is losing interest in school, struggling with school work, dealing with a bully or facing some other difficulty.
- · By 6th grade, absenteeism is one of three signs that a student may drop out of high school.
- By 9th grade, attendance is a better predictor of graduation rates than 8th grade test scores.
- Missing 10%, or 2 days a month, over the course of the school year, can affect a student's academic success.

#### WHAT YOU CAN DO

#### Make school attendance a priority

- Talk about the importance of showing up to school every day.
- · Help your children maintain daily routines, such as finishing homework and getting a good night's sleep.
- Try not to schedule dental and non-Covid-19 related medical appointments during the school day.
- Keep your child healthy, and if you are concerned about Covid-19, call your school for advice.
- If your children must stay home because they are sick or in guarantine, make sure they have asked teachers for resour and materials to make up for the missed learning time in the classroom.

#### Help your teen stay engaged

- Find out if your children feel engaged by their classes, and feel safe from bullies and other threats.
   Make sure your children are not missing class because of challenges with behavioral issues or school discipline policies.
- Make sure your children are not missing class because of challenges with behavioral issues or school discipline policies.
   If any of these are problems, contact the school and work with them to find a solution.
- Monitor you child's academic progress and seek help from teachers or tutors when necessary. Make sure teachers know how to contact you.
- Stay on top of your child's social contacts. Peer pressure can lead to skipping school, while students without many friends can feel isolated.
- · Encourage your child to join meaningful after-school activities, including sports and clubs
- Notice and support your children if they are showing signs of anxiety.

#### Communicate with the school

- Know the school's attendance policy incentives and penalties.
- Check on your child's attendance to be sure absences are not adding up.
   Seek help from school staff, other parents or community agencies if you need support.

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#### 2022-2023 Updated Student COVID Guidelines 8/23/22

#### "My WLS student tested positive!"

- · Isolate (stay home) five days from the start of symptoms.
- Call your school's attendance line and let them know your student has tested positive and should be marked absent for five days.
- Your student may return on day six as long as symptoms have improved and 24 hours have passed without needing fever-reducing medication; a mask should be worn for five additional days.

#### "My WLS student was exposed to a confirmed COVID case."

- A mask is no longer required after a known exposure but recommended for 10 days.
- For ten days after exposure, watch for symptoms.
- Keep your student home if symptoms develop and follow up with a health care provider.

#### "My WLS student is starting to feel sick."

- Stay home and follow up with a health care provider if symptoms continue.
- Testing can be completed, at your discretion, with an at-home test, by your healthcare provider or a testing site.
- · You are not required to submit any official documentation of a test result.
- Washington Local Schools' nurses will continue to provide COVID test kits if desired, while supplies last.



The above applies, regardless of vaccine status. The CDC recommends being up-to-date on vaccinations. If you have questions regarding vaccinations, please contact your healthcare provider.
